# From Pastor Phil....

In *Ephesians 1*, Paul makes this wonderful statement of thanks regarding the church at Ephesus. He gives thanks for them personally, but also for all the work that God has done through them. *Verses 15-19* read:

<sup>"15</sup> For this reason, because I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, <sup>16</sup> I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers, <sup>17</sup> that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of him, <sup>18</sup> having the eyes of your hearts enlightened, that you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints,<sup>19</sup> and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power toward us who believe, according to the working of his great might."

# Zion's Ladies Aid, Men's Club, & LWML

## **Celebrate Special Anniversaries in July 2025!**

Zion's "Ladies Aid Society, which had organized in 1900 'with a 100 active members', made its first contribution to the congregation at this time: church pews, the altar and pulpit, the statue of Christ, altar covers, and carpeting and matting surrounding the altar. The total cost of the items contributed was \$1,381.50.

In 1921, when the church building was 17 years old, the congregation decided to redecorate the interior. The Ladies Aid paid \$1,500 for the project, which included new altar covers and carpet runners.

...the Ladies Aid minutes were kept in German until 1930.

In 1942, the Ladies Aid purchased a loud speaker and microphone system for the church. The church interior was again redecorated in 1943, at a cost of \$1,100. The loudspeaker and microphone system were removed because it was felt they were "too modern." An additional \$560 was spent for rewiring and \$200 for sanding floors. Apparently new plumbing wasn't too modern, though. In 1945, the Ladies Aid donated \$432.72 to put new bathrooms in the back of the church.

In 1947, the Ladies Aid donated \$330 for an outdoor church bulletin board.

"Shortly after World War II began, the Ladies Aid purchased a service flag to hang on the church in honor of members who served."

In 1963 the church roof was insulated, thanks to a gift of more than \$700 from the Ladies Aid."

"The goal of the Ladies Aid is to further the work of the congregation and the kingdom of God by aiding in the work of the church. Activities include these annual events: Rummage Sale, Bazaar, Mother/Daughter Banquet, and the Sausage Super. The Ladies Aid has been instrumental in the history of the congregation and the school. All women of the congregation are, who are communicant members, are eligible for membership."

# Zion's Men's Club

"The Men's Club was organized in 1935 to promote Christian fellowship among male members of Zion. Records show that one of their first purchases was two set of horseshoes (at a cost of \$2.25 from Fritz Drug Store).

During the past 62 years, they have paid for sports equipment, built the garage at the parsonage (with a gift of \$500 from Ladies Aid), rewired and air conditioned the parsonage and purchased office machines, paid for doors, and intercom system for the school, repaired and tuck pointed the roof and other maintenance for the maintenance for the school, took care of the church cupola repairs, covered all the exposed wood on the church exterior with aluminum, and fully repaired and maintained the teacherage. For more than 30 years, Zion's Men's Club shared the expenses of the church weekly service bulletin. And in the last 25 years, they have contributed more than \$65,000 in repairs and maintenance to the church properties.

The Men's Club has sponsored a dart ball team since 1944 in the M-M Dart League.

In 1976, the Men's Club elected to support Zion's seminary fieldworkers by paying their gas mileage from St. Louis to Staunton and back. This practice continues to this day.

In February 1960, the Men's Club and the Ladies Aid joined in a far reaching endeavor: the annual Sausage Supper. Although this event requires many hours of volunteer labor, it remains our congregation's primary fellowship event. Former members, former workers and even a politician or two are seen among the thousands of guests who join us each year."

The history of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League is long and compelling. It spans over 80 years of service to our Lord Jesus and His church. It started with a sincere interest in rescuing the thousands of orphans stranded in the throes of post-World War II Europe and is still steeped in the tradition of aiding the lost sheep of the world.

Our own personal LWML in Staunton was very active in the 1980's and 90's. When more and more women were employed outside the home, our numbers dwindled and we struggled to keep going at the vigorous pace of years before. Gone were the days of get togethers to make "tie quilts" for the impoverished of Africa or the hurricane victims of the coasts. Gone were the days of fellowship with other Lutheran women, mostly homemakers, who loved the outlet of getting together for a higher purpose than just "women's work." Lives for many women just became busier and they didn't have the time.

In the early 2000's, we still had stalwart servants of the LWML like JoAnn Dietiker, Shirley Mueller, Sondra Ashley, JoAnn Brakhane and Barb Quade. What wonderful examples of Christian service and leadership! And there were many more!

In 1992, a book was written by member, Jane Lucht, of Red Bud IL to recall the history of the Southern Illinois District of LWML. It was to celebrate 50 years of Serving Christ. The following are some excerpts of interest to our group.

#### Page 28 of 50th anniversary book, written by Jane Lucht:

"I joined after I married in 1948. We were associated with Ladies Aid. I went when possible between having seven children. After the kids were a little older I became more active. Then I found out why I joined! The joy in all the ladies' hearts just shows all the time. God's love is so obvious. I feel SO GOOD after going to convention, retreat and even meetings. In a small way I feel I truly am "serving

The International LWML convention was scheduled to take place in New Orleans, Louisiana in 1955. They had to cancel the meeting because of segregation in Louisiana. "Local customs of segregation make it impossible for the New Orleans zone to to fully entertain the LWML in a manner characteristic of this organization."

#### Someone said that the letters LWML must mean "Ladies Who Mean Love."

Pastor Edward Meyer, of Zion, Staunton served as counselor for many years in the 1950's. JoAnn Dietiker served on the District Board starting in the 1980's and continued throughout her life. When planning one of the events for the district, she recalled the support and care that she received from fellow "LWMLers" when her husband was taken to the hospital and also when her mother passed away. "The love and caring at these times from my sisters in Christ gave me much support and strength. I will never forget this."

The LWML and Ladies Aid at Zion joined forces in late 2011. At that time, Lorraine Blotevogel was president of Ladies Aid, Shirley Mueller, president of LWML. The MIssion Statement of the SID LWML was adopted - The Mission of the Southern Illinois District of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League is to encourage each woman in the district to grow spiritually and to use her God-given gifts to praise God and serve people. The Ladies Aid/LWML meetings continued bimonthly with Bible study and reports on local and outside mission projects.

Now in 2025, Lutheran Women in Mission (our official name) is beginning to grow in size and purpose. We have continued our bimonthly meetings, complete with Bible study and fellowship, and education about the many mission opportunities throughout the organization. We have determined to support these projects through our mite ingatherings held 2-3 times per year. We encourage all in our congregation to get involved and give from their hearts when it comes to serving the Lord with gladness, putting others before self and experiencing the joy in giving from the heart. We serve our local community by volunteering where we can, including holding a tea party for residents of Glenwood Assisted Living two times per year.

Like our ancestors before us, we desire to be involved with the spread of the Gospel by supporting mission projects throughout the earth, going to the Lord in prayer and the study of His Word.

#### Ladies Aid 1972-2025

I joined Ladies Aid 50 plus years ago when my youngest daughter's class had to sing for a Ladies Aid Birthday Potluck. My friend twisted my arm, so I joined at that time. There was a Birthday Potluck in March and October. In March the members with birthdays from July through December would have to bring the food. Then in October the members with birthdays January through June would bring the food. We also had a Mother-Daughter Banquet in May. Food would be brought by a member and they would bring enough for the guest. When there wasn't enough food, then it was catered. It quit in the 1990's.

Norman Henke and Zelda Zuber were co-chairmans of the Sausage Supper. When Zelda quit, Melba DeVries and I did it. When Melba quit, Shirley Mueller and I did it. When Shirley quit, Arlene Isenberg and I were in charge. Somewhere in that time schedule, Norman Henke quit and turned it over to Gene Reed and Roger Leetham. I quit after 35 years, and Arlene Isenberg did it by herself. At the present, it is Tim Seelbach and Georgia Henke.

The Ladies Aid did many repairs around the church and school. We replaced the curbing on Henry Street, and put in a lift going downstairs in the Parish Center. Ladies Aid paid 1/3 of the cost of security, flooring in the school basement, and railing along the ramp to the Parish Center.

The Ladies Aid also had a Fall-Christmas Bazaar. Everyone donated items to sell. We also had the woven rugs to sell. Members would come weekly to make items to sell.

About 10 years ago, 2 members of LWML came to Ladies Aid and asked if LWML could join Ladies Aid and have meetings together. Since then, we have been together, and it has worked good. We have the Ladies Aid business meeting and then LWML highlights, and then we all join in for the Bible Study. We could use more members. Any female can join at any time. Just come to our meetings at any time, which are posted in the bulletin several weeks before the meeting. I have met many friends and it was a joy to help out with the projects. The present officers are: Gladys Bruhn-President, Shirley Mueller-Vice President, Jan Johnson-Secretary, and Cheryl Moore-Treasurer. Sue Miller is head of LWML.

# Zion Lutheran Ladies Aid

Without a doubt, many of the fine facilities enjoyed by members of Zion Lutheran Church would not exist, if it were not for the dedicated, hard working Ladies society. Older than the present church building itself, the Ladies Aid was organized back in 1900 with 100 active members. Early records indicate that Justina Lich was one of its early officers, serving as secretary-treasurer in 1902.

The original purpose of the organization may have been to provide Christian Fellowship for the church ladies, but the list of contributions made by this organization indicates that the group soon learned how to combine work with fun. At the time the church was built in 1904, the Ladies Aid paid for the church pews, the altar, the pulpit, the altar covers, plus the carpet and the matting. Four years later, they contributed \$2,300.00 toward the purchase of the church organ.

But this was just the beginning. Through the years, this active organization, with a membership peak of 215 in 1925, has contributed over \$55,000.00 toward church

projects. This includes equipment and cash donations when the church was deeply in debt. It does not, however, include the number of hours which the Ladies have always given without charge toward church projects.

Through their efforts, the school basement now boasts a completely remodeled efficient kitchen. From this kitchen have come thousands of delicious church dinners, which have helped pay for the organization's many projects. In earlier years, the ladies provided an annual dinner as part of the school picnic. From 1950-1957, they sponsored an annual Christmas Fair. Then in 1960, they joined forces with the Men's Club in sponsoring the annual Sausage Supper.

In 1951, they began serving the weekly meetings of the Staunton Rotary Club and have continued to do so ever since. In addition, their records show numerous chili suppers, spaghetti dinners, and the serving of many other special dinners for community organizations. Under their direction, the school's hot lunch program was initiated in 1947.

Always working for the church and this school, the ladies have purchased equipment for the school, purchased numerous items for the church, contributed to the upkeep and redecoration of church buildings, and annually been responsible for giving the church a thorough spring house cleaning.

This organization has indeed earned a place of honor in the Zion family.

Present officers are President Judy Sherfy, Vice president Edith Passetti, Financial secretary Ruby Hering, Secretary Lois Stratmann, and Treasurer Zelda Zuber.
